## Faith-Based Institutional Authorization and Compliance Statement

**AMISUN – American Islamic University** is a faith-based higher-education institution legally established in the State of Texas.

The University operates under a **religious exemption** granted by the **Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB)**, authorizing AMISUN to offer degree programs in Islamic and theological disciplines.

Under this exemption, AMISUN may award degrees in the following categories as specified in its authorization letter:

A. Islamic Studies B. Islamic Law (Fiqh) C. Qur'an & Hadith D. Comparative Religion E. Islamic Education F. Islamic Leadership and Da'wah

These programs are **religious in nature** and are **not subject to state regulation or academic accreditation** under the provisions of the Texas Education Code § 132.022, pertaining to faith-based institutions.

#### Faith-Based Compliance Addendum

AMISUN is recognized by the **Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board** as an *exempt religious institution* under Texas Education Code § 61.313.

This exemption allows the University to confer **religious and theological degrees** designed exclusively for ministerial, educational, and community leadership within Islamic and interfaith contexts.

Under this authority, AMISUN may lawfully grant:

- 1. **Religious and Theological Degrees** Qur'anic Studies, Hadith & Sunnah, Islamic Law, Comparative Religion, and Islamic Pedagogy.
- 2. **Faith-Integrated Professional Programs** studies connecting Islamic principles with governance, economics, education, health, and technology.
- 3. **Ministerial and Leadership Training** preparing imams, chaplains, educators, and interfaith peacebuilders.

All AMISUN programs are explicitly religious in purpose and are not intended as preparation for secular licensure or state-regulated professions.

No implication of regional or national accreditation is made or should be inferred.

## Voluntary Academic Standards

Although exempt from state regulation, **AMISUN – American Islamic University** voluntarily upholds academic and administrative standards consistent with recognized norms of U.S. faith-based

higher education.

The University affirms that academic quality, ethical governance, and institutional accountability are integral expressions of its faith mission.

Quality assurance and continuous improvement are maintained through:

- The Board of Directors, which oversees institutional integrity and strategic policy;
- The Academic Council, responsible for curriculum design, faculty evaluation, and program review; and
- The Research and Ethics Agencies, ensuring scholarly rigor, originality, and compliance with moral and professional codes of conduct.

AMISUN adopts internal benchmarks modeled after accrediting best practices-focusing on measurable learning outcomes, transparent governance, and student welfare-while remaining faithful to its religious exemption and theological purpose.

## ☐ AMISUN Linguistic Integration & Epistemic Inclusivity Policy

(Draft for catalog, accreditation submission, and faculty orientation manual)

#### I. Rationale

AMISUN – American Islamic University recognizes that divine revelation was preserved in Arabic, yet divine knowledge ('*ilm*) transcends linguistic boundaries.

Only 15 percent of the global Muslim community are native Arabic speakers; therefore, the university affirms that access to revelation and ethical inquiry must be open to all humanity, regardless of language or ethnicity.

This policy establishes a framework for teaching, research, and publication in English and other world languages while retaining accurate reference to Arabic scriptural terminology.

#### II. Guiding Principles

#### 1. Universality of Revelation

- · Language is a vehicle, not a monopoly of truth.
- The Qur'anic message of clarity ( $bay\bar{a}n$ ) mandates that knowledge be communicated in the learner's own language (Q 14:4).

#### 2. Faith-Integrated Scholarship

- · All disciplines-humanities, sciences, and professional studies-shall be taught through ethical and theological integration consistent with Qur'anic values.
- · Arabic terms will be retained for authenticity but accompanied by clear English equivalents and explanations.

#### 3. Avoidance of Cultural Exclusivism

- · AMISUN rejects ethnic or linguistic hierarchy within Islam.
- The University promotes a global Islamic scholarship inclusive of African, Asian, European, and American intellectual heritages.

#### 4. Terminological Transparency

- · Arabic terms that have been politically or emotionally charged (e.g., *Sharīʿah*, *Jihād*) will be academically defined using neutral, human-centered translations:
  - · Sharī 'ah → "Ethical Path of Divine Guidance"
  - · Figh → "Applied Moral Reasoning"
  - · Jihād → "Striving for Moral Excellence."

#### 5. Linguistic Pluralism in Teaching and Publication

- · English will serve as the primary medium of instruction for degree programs.
- · Arabic, Urdu, and other languages may be used for textual analysis or comparative study modules.
- Faculty are encouraged to publish in both English and Arabic to bridge scholarly communities.

#### 6. Faith-Consistent Academic Freedom

• Scholarly debate conducted in any language remains bound by the university's ethical code: pursuit of truth, respect for difference, and fidelity to divine purpose.

#### III. Implementation

#### 1. Curricular Integration

- Each syllabus will include a "Faith and Language Integration" paragraph translating key Arabic terms into clear academic English.
- · New course titles should prefer universal descriptors, e.g., *Islamic Ethics and Social Justice* rather than *'Ilm al-Akhlaq*.

#### 2. Faculty Development

· Annual workshops on "Multilingual Faith Pedagogy" will train instructors to communicate Islamic knowledge effectively to non-Arabic audiences.

#### 3. Public Communications

· All public documents, websites, and catalog entries will present Arabic terms in parentheses after the English translation, not as the default heading.

#### 4. Academic Publishing

· AMISUN Press will launch the *Divine Knowledge Series*-peer-reviewed textbooks and readers in English with bilingual glossaries-to expand the global library of faith-integrated academic literature.

#### Credit Hour System

AMISUN operates on the **U.S. semester credit-hour model**, in line with recognized academic standards and international comparability.

- One (1) credit hour corresponds to a minimum of 15 contact hours of instruction or faculty-supervised academic activity per semester.
- · Most courses carry **3 credit hours**, representing approximately **45 instructional hours**.
- Laboratory, internship, or research-based courses may vary in contact-hour equivalence depending on practical intensity and faculty supervision.

Each degree program has a prescribed number of credits required for graduation, as defined in individual faculty course outlines.

#### Grade Point Average (GPA) Calculation

#### Incomplete & Withdrawal Policy

Students unable to complete required coursework within the term due to verified reasons (illness, emergency, or approved leave) may receive an "I" (Incomplete).

Incomplete grades must be resolved within **one subsequent semester**, or they automatically convert to "F."

Withdrawal requests must be submitted before **the 10th week** of a regular semester.

#### Philosophy of Admission

Admissions at AMISUN – American Islamic University are based on the belief that education is a divine trust (amānah) and that every individual with sincere intent and academic readiness should have access to learning that integrates faith, intellect, and service.

AMISUN welcomes students of all backgrounds who respect its Islamic mission, uphold academic ethics, and seek personal, spiritual, and professional growth through knowledge.

#### General Admission Requirements

Applicants must provide documentation that demonstrates readiness for university-level study. Requirements vary slightly by program level but generally include:

Undergraduate (Bachelor's Level)

- · High school diploma or recognized equivalent.
- · Completed online or printed **Application for Admission** form.
- Two letters of recommendation (academic, community, or religious).
- · One-page statement of purpose outlining educational and moral objectives.
- · Copy of government-issued ID or passport.
- · Application processing fee (non-refundable).

#### Graduate (Master's Level)

- Bachelor's degree in a relevant discipline (preferably from a faith-based or accredited institution).
- · Official transcripts from all previous institutions.
- · Academic résumé or CV.
- · Statement of research interest or proposed study area.
- Two academic or professional references.

#### Doctoral & J.I.D. Programs

- · Master's degree (or equivalent professional qualification).
- · Submission of a preliminary research proposal.
- · Evidence of scholarly writing or published work (where applicable).
- · Interview with the Graduate Council or supervising Dean.

#### **International Applicants**

AMISUN welcomes international students who meet equivalent academic standards.

- · Non-native English speakers must demonstrate proficiency through recognized tests or prior English-medium education.
- · Visa sponsorship information and enrollment letters are provided upon admission.
- The University complies with U.S. immigration regulations and Department of Homeland Security reporting requirements for faith-based institutions.

#### Transfer Admissions

Students transferring from other universities-whether faith-based or accredited-may request credit recognition.

Credit transfer is reviewed individually by the **Academic Council** based on:

- · Course equivalence and academic rigor.
- · Faith-based alignment with AMISUN curricula.
- · Official transcripts and syllabi from the prior institution.

A maximum of **60 undergraduate** or **12 graduate credits** may be transferred, subject to faculty approval.

#### **Enrollment Procedure**

- 1. **Application Submission** through the online or printed portal.
- 2. **Document Verification** by the Office of Admissions.
- 3. **Academic Evaluation** by the appropriate faculty.
- 4. **Admission Decision** issued by the Registrar.
- 5. Tuition Payment & Course Registration.

Admitted students receive an official AMISUN Student ID and access to the Learning Management System (LMS).

## **Payment Policies**

- 1. **Tuition Payment Deadline:** All tuition and fees are due within two weeks of registration unless an installment plan is approved.

Whether on campus or online, every member of the AMISUN community is expected to demonstrate courtesy, respect, and cooperation.

The University provides a faith-centered learning environment that nurtures spiritual growth, intellectual maturity, and civic engagement.

#### General Code of Conduct

All students agree to uphold the following standards:

- 2. **Respect:** Courtesy toward faculty, staff, and peers regardless of gender, ethnicity, or faith.

#### Academic Integrity & Research Ethics

Commitment to Truth and Scholarship

At **AMISUN – American Islamic University**, academic integrity is not merely an institutional policy; it is a **spiritual and moral obligation**.

Knowledge ('Ilm) in Islam is both a trust (Amānah) and a responsibility (Taklīf).

Therefore, every act of research, writing, or study must reflect sincerity ( $Ikhl\bar{a}s$ ), honesty (Sidq), and respect for the intellectual labor of others.

AMISUN expects every student, faculty member, and researcher to pursue truth with humility and to honor the ethical foundations of Islamic scholarship.

#### 1. Academic Integrity Policy

Violations of academic integrity undermine both the moral and scholarly mission of the University. The following constitute **academic misconduct** at AMISUN:

- **Plagiarism:** Presenting another person's words, ideas, or work as one's own without proper attribution.
- **Fabrication:** Falsifying data, citations, or research results.
- **Collusion:** Assisting another in academic dishonesty or unauthorized collaboration.
- **Cheating:** Using prohibited materials, devices, or unauthorized assistance during assessments.
- **Multiple Submission:** Submitting the same work for credit in more than one course without instructor approval.
- · **Misrepresentation:** Altering official documents, transcripts, or grades.

All suspected cases are referred to the **Academic Integrity Committee**, which conducts formal reviews and recommends disciplinary action.

#### 3. Research Ethics Guidelines

AMISUN's research philosophy integrates Islamic moral law with international academic standards. All research must uphold the sanctity of life, dignity of subjects, and public good.

#### **Principles of Research Conduct:**

- 1. Honesty and Accuracy in data collection, interpretation, and citation.
- 2. **Respect for Human Subjects**, privacy, and informed consent.
- 3. Environmental and Social Responsibility avoid harm to creation and community.
- 4. **Intellectual Property Protection** recognize contributions of collaborators and cited sources.
- 5. **Faith-Based Sensitivity** ensure that research topics align with moral and ethical standards of Islam while promoting universal benefit.

All graduate and doctoral proposals are subject to review by the **Institutional Research Ethics Board (IREB)**.

#### 4. Publication and Authorship Policy

- 3. Demonstrate mastery of research methodology and interdisciplinary synthesis.
- 4. Engage in international scholarship promoting ethical governance and intellectual pluralism.
- 5. Produce publishable research that advances AMISUN's mission of human development and divine guidance.
